
One more thing. Please include how many in your party are attending.

It has been said that our object should not so much be to get more men into Masonry as to get more Masonry into men.

Information and knowledge is available from around the world – in written, audio and video. Should you wish to continue your Masonic learning I would suggest you consider some of the following:

Masonic scholars and researchers should keep in mind that there are many points of view about various subjects. Just because it is printed does not mean it is absolutely true. It may be one man's opinion.

What Masonic Penalities Are Enforced?

The only penalties known to Freemasonry are reprimand: suspension definite membership; indefinite suspension from membership; and expulsion from the Fraternity. To these must be added that intangible penalty which comes to any one who loses all or part of his reputation. Other penalties suggested in the ritual are wholly symbolic are not now and never have been enforced. They were legal punishments in the middle ages, designed with special reference to the religious beliefs of the time that an incomplete body could not "rise from the dead"; that a body buried in unconsecrated ground (as between high and low water mark) could not ascend into heaven. Some Grand Lodges offer an interpretation of the ritualistic penalties, in order to be sure the initiate understands the symbolic character of these otherwise difficult phrases.

MARK TWAIN AT BENT LODGE



RWB Jefferson Jordan returns to Bent Lodge (Sunday, October 5th) in the guise of his alter ego, Samuel Clements, better known as the great American author and humorist, Mark Twain.

Bro. Mark Twain, himself, had many indirect ties to the southwest in general, and Taos in particular. He was a member of the Ancient, Free and Accepted Brotherhood of Masons, having received the Degrees during the Spring and Summer of 1861 at Polar Star Lodge Number 79 in St. Louise, Missouri. This brings up one of those indirect connections to Taos, since the Grand Lodge of Missouri first granted a Charter to Bent Lodge Number 204 in 1860. During his life, Bro. Twain became a great friend and traveling companion of Henry Huddleston Rogers, founder of Standard Oil. Mr. Rogers was the grandfather of Millicent Rogers, famous heiress and art patroness who made her home in Taos, and whose son still lives at Turtle Walk on Ranchitos Road.

RWB Jordan has studied everything about Mark Twain, who was a personal hero, and takes center stage in the person of the famous humorist, so convincingly, that most come away feeling like they have actually met the great man himself. Bro. Jeff, dressed in period clothing and sporting a Panama

hat and puffing on a comforting stogie, tells stories, praises the famous and criticized the infamous, all the while peppering his monologue with those witty and profound quotations. Quotations that although were penned over a hundred years ago, have as much meaning today as they did then.

RWB Jordan is the current Deputy Grand Master of Masons in New Mexico and makes his home in Albuquerque.

GEN. JAMES H. CARLETON, KIT CARSON'S COMMANDING OFFICER

Bro. Richard Thompson is a very capable historian, with emphasis in the Southwest around the mid-19th Century. Bro. Rick is well known for his portrayal of several historical figures, most notably, Brother James Henry Carleton, who as General of the American Army, ordered Bro. Kit Carson to subdue the Navajo and march the tribe to Bosque Redondo. Bro. Rick has performed his portayal twice at the Kit Carson Home and Museum with great audience appeal and interaction.
